Rectors letter

RAF Induction As I am sure most of you are aware, I have just been commissioned as a chaplain in the RAF; it is a new type of commission designed solely for ex-regulars to come back in on a zero-hours contract and offer support when needed. As RAF Chaplains don't have anyone between Lossiemouth (near Inverness) and Boulmer (in Northumberland) The Chaplain in Chief approached Bishop John who was happy to recommend me, should any pastoral support to RAF personnel and their families be required in Central and Southern Scotland, and Northern England.

As part of my induction, I attended a course for Anglican RAF Chaplains at The Defence Academy near Swindon; within its grounds is Beckett House, (pictured below this article) home to The Armed Forces Chaplaincy Centre; when it is not hosting chaplaincy training across the three services, it runs courses for the wider military on subjects including listening skills, ethics, and pastoral support. Central to its ethos is rank is left at the door, so whether a private soldier or a Lieutenant General, everyone is in civilian clothes, eats together and shares the same accommodation.

My course ran over 5 days and was structured around a morning eucharist and evening prayer. We had a wonderful variety of speakers and facilitators; the highlight for me were the sessions led by The Rt Rev'd Sean Semple, the Bishop of Cyprus and The Gulf. Although based in Cyprus, his diocese covers the whole of the Arabian Penninsular and Iraq. As you can imagine, such a diocese is challenging, and the bishop must tread a very narrow diplomatic path; Countries such as Saudi Arabia have a blanket ban on any Anglican presence. Other Muslim countries allow Anglican worship, but strictly a no proselyting rule, so churches are placed in a compound and serve predominantly ex pats, and foreign workers. The compounds are policed to ensure no locals attend. As Bishop Sean remarked, 'some of us will be the only bibles that others will read'.


In Southern Cyprus, where Greek Orthodoxy is the predominant denomination, the Anglican church has a few of its own buildings but also uses Greek orthodox Churches. This too brings its problems as the Orthodox Church has strict policy on women priests; a woman is not even allowed to enter a church dressed as a priest, let alone take an Anglican service, so there are some charges which are not available to women. The Orthodox church is generally hostile towards Muslims, engaging in little, if any, dialogue and the Anglican churches have played a significant role in building up good relationships with the Muslim faith community and finding ways of working together.

Yet despite these challenges, the churches are flourishing, ministering to vibrant congregations from many different cultures: Even in war torn Yemen, the Anglican church has a presence, running an eye clinic in the church grounds even though the church itself cannot open. The Anglican church in Baghdad is thriving and runs a free dental clinic and a pharmacy, and in the year he has been in post has made great strides in building up relationships with other church and faith leaders and with a diocesan staff of just three (Including him) he is kept very busy!

Other speakers included the Bishop to the Forces, and the Military lay Rep for the Church of England General synod, who led a surprisingly humorous session on Church of England Governance. We had sessions on the relationship between Art and Spirituality from Professor Maggi Dawn, and an excellent presentation from Kate Bruce, an RAF chaplain on preaching and imagination.

But perhaps most importantly for me was the opportunity to meet my new colleagues in the RAF and to feel that I am very much a part of their family; I ask that you keep them in your prayers, especially those currently deployed in The Falklands and The Gulf and thank you St Martin's for allowing me the time away.

I share a message with you from Bishop Andrew Swift, who will be convening the Electoral process:

"The election of a new Bishop is a vital part of the life and ministry of a Scottish Episcopal diocese. As you start the preparations to say farewell to Bishop John, please keep in prayer him and Clare and also all those who will be supporting the process to elect his successor. This process is just starting to begin now, with each charge in the Diocese being asked to share a

short profile, to reflect on where you are as a church community and how the next Bishop might be able to support you in your next season of life. These profiles are vital to the election process, as we will use this information, gathered together, in the production of descriptions of the role and person who will be called to be your next Bishop! And please especially pray for all those clergy who might be willing to discern over the next months if they may have a call to be the next Bishop of Edinburgh. Please read this email very carefully and share it in your charges, as it will guide you through the beginning of the Canon 4 electoral process."

Electing a bishop is one of the most important moments of the life of a diocese and is a matter of vocation and spiritual discernment. A Vacancy in See is also an exciting missional opportunity; because it will engage interest more widely. When we add a Bishop Search tab to our diocesan website, and put information on, and update the website and our social media platforms we will be saying who we are, what matters to us, and where we are going, which will draw interest from beyond the Church.

Of course, we will have the opportunity to explore something of who we are and where we are going when we gather together for the Diocesan Big Day on Saturday, 10 May at St Mary's Cathedral and share there the blessings we have received and offered in our communities.

For now, the practical task of collating information for the Diocesan Description is upon us (Canon 4.4b). In this endeavour, you have a clear role to play, as each charge owns its story and is best placed to tell it. The Diocesan Standing Committee now invites you to share your congregational profile and vision so that it might connect with candidates and inspire them to apply.

Accordingly, we are looking for the following to be returned by Vestry Secretaries or Charge Clergy:

- A submission of not more than 300 words about the current life of your charge, citing two examples of things going well where the strengths of your activities and involvement lie and one which you consider a current challenge. Do not pretend that things are different from what they are. If you feel/know you are having a tough time, then say so. However, also try to show that you are up for a challenge and want things to be better in the future, even if you do not quite know what that future looks like.
- Three good quality photos depicting events, activities and/or services which your church community has undertaken (recently). Ideally, your photos will be of people in landscape orientation.
- Separately, we would also like each charge to provide a number of words (maybe 5-10) to describe what is important in the next bishop, as we are considering creating a *word cloud* (a visual representation of text data where the size of each word indicates its frequency or importance) from your suggestions. This would bring together our

collective thoughts about what our Diocese needs in our next bishop. As a congregational activity then, perhaps during or after a Sunday service, you might ask the question, 'what does the Diocese need in our next bishop?', and follow that up with, 'what skills and characteristics are desired?'.



St Martin's Toddler and Baby Group

Toddler Martians

Many people aren't aware that the toddler group is part of St Martin's weekly use of the building, and was started about 17 years ago. Sophia had Phoebe and the twins Rhona and Freya all under 3 years old and decided to start the group. It was about 5 weeks before we began to get people coming and its never looked back since.

We collected toys, some had belonged to the original playgroup at the old St Martin's and anything that we had spare. Since then we have been eco-friendly, using and reusing toys brought by parents, found in charity shops or donated to the church from other groups. Dalry nursery donated some and a toy library which was closing down let us choose what we would like. Anything that is unsuitable for the group is collected and we have a sale.

The group is multicultural and many children are bilingual. Mums, dads, grandparents, carers and nannies bring their children so there is a nice mix.

We offer play, refreshments of breadsticks and fruit for the children and tea and coffee for the adults and finish with a sing song of action rhymes and nursery rhymes.

We run on donations only, although the rental charge is included in St Martin's annual rental payment for the Church's use of the building.

It runs alongside the Toy Library which was started several years ago. It was the idea of a group from the local churches wanting to do something for the community. As there was no toy library on this side of Edinburgh, local grants were sought and the Library was created. St Martin's seemed to be the only church to have space so it was installed. Like the Toddlers, it's manned by a group of volunteers and members of St Martin's and thanks to Stuart it runs well and is a success.

Recently we had a visit from Auntie Liz's friend Ellie Stratton. She liked what we are doing and gave us a generous donation to honour her friend in the work we do. This gave me quite a headache trying to decide what to do, and how to do it. After some discussion with others involved, we have now spent the money.

The most used toys at the playgroup are the cups, pretend food, teapots etc, always a busy area. This symbolises the kitchen as a centre for food and conversation, and company, and we have all enjoyed that with Liz. Liz has always been known as Aunty Liz by our children and other groups at St Martin's as opposed to her sister in law, Mrs Liz. We bought a toy kitchen for the group and Stuart made a sign, 'Auntie Liz's kitchen'. Play continues and they all enjoy the company.

The Cars and vehicles are always popular. We have had several road maps for the vehicles but they quickly get creased and tear. As Liz is always driving someone around and is known as St Martin's Taxi, we bought a rug road map for the group. The children can now drive their cars along the roads.

As you know, Liz organises the fund raising for Elinor's Orphanage, so it seemed appropriate to give the rest of the money to that cause. The orphanage has received their first instalment and will receive another at Christmas time. An invaluable aid for their existence.

I'd like to think we have spent wisely and we have honoured Liz in the work she does and we wish her all the best with her training.





Tony's Kitchen


